"But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times."

3 Therefore Israel will be abandoned until the time when she who is in labor bears a son, and the rest of his brothers return to join the Israelites.

4 He will stand and shepherd his flock in the strength of the Lord, in the majesty of the name of the Lord his God. And they will live securely, for then his greatness will reach to the ends of the earth.

- o Share any words or phrases that speak into your life today.
- Why is the choice of Bethlehem as the birthplace of the ruler significant, both in its historical insignificance and its role in the biblical narrative?
- o How does this prophecy connect with the broader themes of Advent and Christmas, particularly God's use of humble beginnings to bring about His plans?
- o In verse 2, Micah emphasizes that Bethlehem, though small, will be the birthplace of a ruler. How does this reflect God's pattern of using the unexpected or overlooked for His purposes?
- Verse 4 describes the ruler standing in strength and providing security for His people. How does this imagery point us to the person and work of Jesus Christ?
- o Micah describes this ruler as bringing peace (v. 5a). What kind of peace does Jesus bring, and how does it differ from worldly definitions of peace?
- o How does the promise of security in this passage address feelings of insecurity in our lives today?
- The song *Christmas Shoes* highlights themes of love and generosity in the face of hardship.
 How does this song's message of sacrificial giving align with the hope and transformation described in Micah 5?



o How does Christ's eternal love, as foretold in Micah, inspire us to live with generosity and confidence, even when we face challenges?
